



At the Partnership Board everybody is equal. We are all important. It is important that we can all join in and say what we think.




To make sure we do this we all need to use easy words and no jargon



 Have the right services to support you where you live.

 Stop you going into hospital unless you really need to.



## The 9 Principles



 I have an interesting life that I enjoy.


 My Care and Support is well planned.

 I have choice and control about my care and support.



### **The 9 Principles**





• I live in the community with the support I need.

 I have a choice about where I live and who I live with.

 I get good care from health services.




### **The 9 Principles**



 I get help from experts in the community when I need it.

 I get help to stay out of trouble with the Police if I need it.



 If I have to go into a hospital because my health needs cannot be met in the community, it is high quality and I don't stay there longer than I need to.

More Outreach support.

- Less beds in the Agnes Unit.
- Step through project.





 Care and Treatment reviews – checking that people are not in hospital longer than they need to be.

 We need to make sure we have people who can support us to do the Care and Treatment reviews.





 Make sure we know if someone might need to go to hospital – Admission Avoidance register.

 Checking every week who is in hospital and plans for them to leave.





 Working with other services who might work with people with learning disabilities.

 Making there are houses for people to live in.






## Why do we have the Regional and National Forums?




Independent self advocacy - people speaking up for themselves, began in Britain in the 1980s. For the first time people with learning disabilities began to speak up and say what they wanted. The Government began to listen and work with people to look at how to make changes.



In 2001 Nothing About Us Without Us was written this was a report written with help from people with learning disabilities.

It was the first time people with learning disabilities had been involved in advising the Government on how to make changes.





In 2001 the government wrote a report called **Valuing People**. It said that services for people with learning disabilities needed to change. It had ideas in about making life better for people.

The Government wanted to continue to hear what people with learning disabilities had to say one way of doing this was to set up.


We have different meetings to help people with learning disabilities speak out.



National Forum Meetings.



 Regional Forum Meetings. There are 9 different regions across the country.
 We are in the East Midlands Region.



 Local advocacy meetings and meetings in services.

### **National Forum Meetings**



These meetings happen 3 times a year.
Representatives from the 9 Regions go to the meetings. Claire and Rashpal are the Regional representatives for the East Midlands.



The National Forum is run by and for people with learning disabilities, it has 2 Co-chairs and a Vice Chair.



The forum talks about important things for people with learning disabilities, it listens to what local and Regional groups are saying.



The Co-chairs go to a meeting called the **National Learning Disability Board**. This is where they meet with people who work for the Government they say what is important for people.



### **Regional Forum Meetings**



Regional Forum meetings are for anyone with a learning disability in the East Midlands. They happen twice a year.

We talk about what has happened at the National Forum.



We talk about what has been happening in our local areas and about things that will affect us. We have 3 Local reps Zoe, Dawn and Michelle.



Ian and Marie are the Regional Co-ordinators they support the regional meetings to happen.










#### **How it works**


Information is passed on from advocacy groups to regional forums.

The regional forums then take this to the National Forum big meeting.

The National Forum decides which issues will be passed on to the National Disability Board.

This information will then be passed onto the Government. The Government will ask us what we think about new policies and laws for people with learning disabilities.







You can come to our Regional Meetings. We will have 2 regional meetings next year in March and September. We may also have a joint meeting with the Families forum for the East Midlands.



If you can't travel to meetings

- You can send us information about what is happening in your area.
- We can send you information about what is happening Regionally and Nationally.



We will pass on what you tell us to the National Forum and they will let the Government know what is happening all over the country.



#### **Purpose of the presentation**


To tell the Partnership Board about a new way to pay for support and care. It's called Direct Payment Card




- If you have care and support needs to help you live your life, you and your social worker will agree a Support Plan so that you can do the things you want to do.
- The Council will agree an amount of money to help you do that.
   This is called a Personal Budget.
- When the Council pays you this money, it is called a Direct Payment.


There are different ways that this money can be paid.





- The council can look after the money and buy your care and support for you.
- A family member or carer can look after the money and buy your care and support for you.
- The money can be paid directly to the person or company who gives you your care and support for them to look after.







- Some people look after the money themselves. This involves setting up a bank account, keeping receipts and being responsible for the money you spend. This can be quite hard to do.
- We now have a new way of making this payment to you.
   We can give you a Direct Payment Card.





- Put your hand up if you get a Direct Payment?
- Put your hand up if you use a debit card to pay for shopping?
- A Direct Payment card is like a bank card.




### What is good about a direct payment card?








- It makes it easier for you to manage the money for your care and support.
- The money is put into a special bank account set up by the Council so you don't have to do anything.
- You can use the card to pay for the things you need to do on your support plan.
- It helps you manage your money yourself.
- It will help you be more independent.







- We have sent letters out to everyone about how to get a Direct Payment card.
- Has anybody had a letter about a Direct Payment card?
- The Council hopes lots of people decide to have a Direct Payment card but you can say No.

It is your choice.





- There are people who can help you decide about having a Direct Payment card.
- You can talk to your social worker or your family to decide if this is a good choice for you.
- If you don't have a social worker and the person who supports you needs help to decide, they can talk to Chetan Patel at the Council. His telephone number is 0116 3053398.



## Health Checks what we want to do?




 Make sure Education, Health and Care plans include information about health checks.

## Health checks what we have done?




 Updated the "All about Learning Disability Health Checks" booklet.

 Supporting a local Dementia project





### What is dementia?



- Dementia is an illness in the brain. It can happen for different reasons.
- People with learning disabilities have a higher risk of having dementia, often earlier than other people.
- Dementia usually develops slowly and can be difficult to diagnose (find out that you have it).

### When a person has dementia they might





forget things easily

There are 3 national screening programmes for cancer screening

Cervical screening

Breast screening

Bowel screening


### **Cervical screening**

Cervical screening is offered to women between the ages of 25 and 60.

Women are usually invited to attend every 3 years.


There is easy read information available.


There is also a film available.

### **Breast screening**





Breast screening is offered to women between the ages of 50 and 70.

Women are usually invited to attend every 3 years.

The team have worked with others to make a DVD and easy read booklet.

### **Bowel screening**




Bowel screening is offered to men and women between the ages of 60 and 70.

People are invited to do the test every 2 years

This test is done at home.

The team have worked with others to make a DVD and easy read booklet.

### **Bowel Scope Screening**



The bowel scope screening test is a new test that is starting to be offered to people in Leicestershire

- The test only happens once at the age of 55
- The test is done in a hospital.
- The test looks for small changes in the bowel that can sometimes turn into cancer if not treated.
- We are working with others to make a DVD and an easy read leaflet about this test.






